

YOU CAN UNDERSTAND THE BIBLE

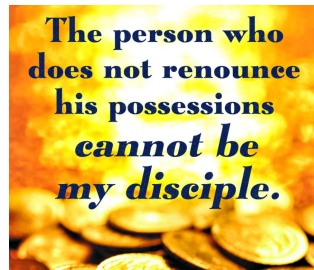

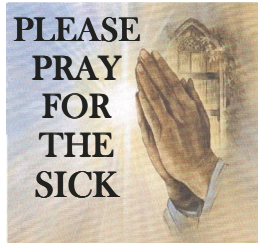
October 2016 Rachel’s Vineyard Retreat

Walk in Holy Cross & Calvary Cemeteries

Holy Cross and Calvary Cemeteries are being featured for the **Saturday, September 17**, walk being presented by the Logan County Genealogical & Historical Society. The graves of Mrs. James Coogan, Nicholas Peifer, the Hickey Family, the Musick Family, Senator T. L. McGrath, Father James Tuohy, Courtney Savage, John Schwenoha, and the Madigan Family will be visited. Presenters will be Judy Lumpp, Mrs. Coogan; Tom Peifer, Nicholas Peifer; Ron Keller as James T. Hickey; Barry King, a member of the Musick Family; Tim Becke, Senator McGrath; Tim McCormick, Father Tuohy; Tim Searby, Courtney Savage; Tom McLaughlin, John Schwenoha, also known as Coonhound Johnny; and Jonathan Wright, Edward Madigan. A history of the Cemeteries will be given by tour guides and bottled water will be available for tour participants. Admission will be by donation. Walks will begin at 9:30 am and continue until 11:30 am-each 15 minute interval. Walks will resume at 1 pm with the last walk of the day beginning at 3 pm. A few golf carts will be available for transportation for those unable to walk the tour route. Chairs will be available throughout the walk, but participants may bring blankets. there is a charge for extensive research performed by volunteer staff. Donations are accepted. The Center will be open for touring and research Saturday, September 17, from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. It will reopen Sunday, September 18, from 10 am until 4 pm. Normal hours are Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays from 11 am until 4 pm and the second and fourth Saturdays from 10 am until 1 pm.

SAINT TERESA OF CALCUTTA

Saint Teresa of Calcutta, known for many years as Mother Teresa of Calcutta, was born on August 26, 1910 as Anjeze (Agnes) Gonxhe Bojaxhiu in Skopje, Macedonia of Albanian heritage. Her father died when she was eight years old leaving her devoutly religious mother to open a business to support the family. Since a very young age, Agnes was very involved in parish activities. She once said, "I was only 12 years old, living with my parents in Skopje, when I first sensed the desire to become a nun. It was then that I realized that my call was to the poor." Then she left home in September 1929 for the Loreto Convent, Rathfarnham (Dublin), Ireland. She was accepted as a postulant on October 12 and received the name of Teresa, after her patroness, St. Therese of Lisieux. Agnes was sent by the convent order to India arriving in Calcutta on January 6, 1929. There she took her final vows as a nun.

On a train journey from Calcutta to Darjeeling, on September 10, 1946, Mother Teresa received the "call within a call" which was the small mustard seed insight that grew into the missionaries of Charity family of Sisters, Brothers, Fathers, and Co-Workers, which was founded in 1950 after nearly a year and a half of lobbying to leave her convent and pursue her calling. She believed her life mission was "to care for the hungry, the naked, the lepers, all those people who feel unwanted, unloved, uncared for throughout society, people that have become a burden to the society and are shunned by everyone."

During the 1950's and 1960's she opened a leper colony, an orphanage, a nursing home, a family clinic, a hospice, centers for the blind, centers for the aged & disabled, many mobile health clinics, many schools, children's & family counseling program and soup kitchens for the suffering & impoverished.

Mother Teresa became one of the first women to receive many awards such as: The Pandra Shri prize (India's 4th highest civilian award) for extraordinary service in 1962, the Pope John XXIII Peace Prize in 1971, the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979 for her work, the John F. Kennedy International Award, Templeton Award for Progress in Religion and the Jawaharlal Nehru award. Mother Teresa said that "leadership is persuasion, not domination; persons who can require others to do their bidding because of their power are not leaders. Leadership only occurs when others willingly adopt, for a period of time, the goals of a group as their own. Thus leadership concerns building cohesive and goal-oriented teams; there is a casual and definitional link leadership and team performance." She was a persistent and determined woman which helped her to be a good leader and enabled her to accomplish her goals.

In an interview with Rev. Brian Kolodiejchuk (promoter of Mother Teresa's cause) James Martin writes that Brian knew Mother Teresa the last 20 years of her life. He states "she was very demanding, especially of her sisters at the same time was really motherly". He also says she was very ordinary, not standing out among the other sisters. However, she would be noticed doing the small extras like genuflecting or taking holy water when entering. She was very observant, Brian says, noticing if some of the sisters were not eating, what was said, or what kind of mood a person was in.

During years of deteriorating health, Mother Teresa continued to do her charitable works until just months before her death at age 87 on September 5, 1997. The last 66 years of her life, she wrote many letters to her confessors and superiors. She wished these letters to be destroyed because she feared people would think because of her struggle with faith, people would think "less of Jesus," but the Vatican demanded they be saved as potential relics of a saint. A candidate saint's writings are the first stage of the canonization process.

Pope Francis took the step by signing a decree declaring that the inexplicable 2008 recovery of a Brazilian man who suddenly woke from a coma caused by a viral brain infection was due to the intercession of the Albanian nun, who died in 1997. The Rev. Brian Kolodiejchuk, said in a statement on Friday, December 18, that the man fully recovered following his wife's prayers and he has since returned to work as a mechanical engineer. The couple also have had two children.

The pontiff's action came three days after a Vatican panel of cardinals and bishops affirmed the judgment of medical experts and theologians who concluded that there was no medical explanation for the apparent cure.

On her tomb, located on the first level of the Motherhouse of the Missionaries of Charity in Calcutta, is written: "Love one another as I have loved you." (St. John's Gospel, Chapter 15)

She began her ministry with nothing; lived like and with the poor; was very humble and ordinary, yet very extraordinary simply because of her love and total commitment to the dignity of all people. May we strive to exemplify her.
